




Year's 1 & 2

Our 2/3/4 building also investigated the Central idea that 'Organisations depend on members to cooperate'. Students embarked on an exciting inquiry learning adventure that blended the fascinating world of organizations with a big focus on the Olympics.

Our young learners began their inquiry by investigating different types of organizations that play a role. From the International Olympic Committee (IOC) to Australian Institute of Sport, AFL and local community groups, students discovered how these entities work together to make things like the Olympics possible. Students learned about the responsibilities of each organization, the hierarchy of an organisation, the logistics of event planning, and the importance of teamwork and communication.

To deepen their understanding, students explored the history of the Olympics, the significance of the Games, and the athletes who inspire us all. Students discussed the values of sportsmanship, perseverance, and how sport can bring everyone together. Through discussions/ wonderings and with the Paris Olympics on, this led to the organisation of the BK-12 Mini Olympics event. Students put their knowledge to the test by organizing and participating in their own Olympic style games. Some of the sports included: potato spoon race, longest wrapper and a complex obstacle course. It was a wonderful day with so many of our wider school community in attendance to join in on all the fun.

Locally, students investigated how other organisations work together such as Boronia K-12 College and how everyone at school plays a pivotal role to ensure everything runs smoothly. We were fortunate enough to have a member of our school community, Lorraine Harris (grandparent of Charlie, Foundation and Connie, Grade 6) come and speak to the students about how members within an organisation, such as Food Bank, need to be cooperative. Lorraine bought in her special medal which highlighted her success and what she does to support our local school and wider community.

Shine on Science Discovery Day Our year 5/6 students had an enriching experience on their Science Discovery Day at KIOSC on Monday 22nd of July, focusing on sustainability and environmental science. The day was dedicated to exploring innovative ways to protect our planet. Students participated in interactive workshops and experiments, they were engaged and excited to take back their findings and ideas to their PYP Exhibition where they have been exploring the Global Sustainability Goals.

The students learned about the environmental benefits of using biodegradable bioplastics to replace many single use plastics. They then created their own bioplastics in the lab following the scientific method, then conducting experiments to compare the properties of plastic vs natural products. They also loved using the popular Scratch program to code their own ocean pollution game on the computers.

It was inspiring to see our young scientists take on the challenge of sustainability with such enthusiasm and creativity.

EARLY LEARNING CENTRE

3 & 4 YEAR OLD KINDER

The 3-year-old children have been introduced to 'Acknowledgement to Country' and read the book 'Country' by Aunty Fay Muir and Sue Lawson. They have begun making discoveries about the Indigenous perspective on 'Country' and throughout this term we will continue to discover more about our land, sky and waters.

Grey, black, blue, and white paints representing winter colours have been introduced at the Easel and Mark Making table to encourage further learning about winter. Pictures depicting winter weather conditions such as snow, rain, and storms have been placed throughout these areas prompting inspiration and extended thinking. Children have been making the connection to our winter weather, with this reflecting in their artwork. Some of our Puggles group have created a snowstorm, thunderstorm, and rain clouds.



We have been very excited to see a new screen installed in our kinder room. Our Curriculum, The Early Years Learning Framework, acknowledges that technology used appropriately and in moderation can be a valuable tool for enhancing learning experiences. Incorporating technology within our curriculum is a great way for children to engage, explore, and participate actively in their education through playing and problem-solving. We all enjoyed engaging in 'Cosmic Yoga' on our new screen. 'Cosmic Yoga' teaches children new ways to move their bodies and develop balance, flexibility, and core strength. Practicing mindfulness can help support children's deeper awareness of their feelings, thoughts, and behaviours.

Catching up with our Grade 5 Buddies is a highlight of our week in 4-year-old Kinder. We were inspired by the Olympics, so we teamed up with our Grade 5 Buddies for an exciting session of planned and organised 'Olympic games'. The Year 5's created lesson plans and we rotated through each station, focusing on a different skill. It was wonderful to observe the older students guiding and encouraging the ELC children. The laughter and smiles filled the playground, highlighting the strong sense of community and support we cherish at our school.



Our new Basketball ring has been a popular outdoor play choice. We often observe the secondary students playing basketball each day, so we were very excited for the opportunity to have a go ourselves in our Kinder yard. Many skills are developed while playing basketball including developing our hand-eye coordination, teamwork skills such as passing to each other, verbally communicating with each other, negotiation and turn-taking, strengthening our balance and coordination and developing concentration skills. While playing basketball we are also building our gross motor muscles which will assist us in many other areas of learning too.

The children practiced important social skills like turn-taking and teamwork during our Road Ramp challenge. We paired up, one child releasing the cars while the other aimed to catch them in a basket before they hit the ground. They then switched roles, offering everyone an equal opportunity to participate. Using a timer ensured fairness, a key component of cooperative play. This activity engaged their gross motor skills and demonstrated their growing ability to work collaboratively.

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ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL REPORT

As Assistant Principal of Wellbeing and Inclusion, one of my key roles is to support students, staff and families of neurodiverse students. At Boronia K-12 we believe that all students have the potential to learn and the right to access and participate in a learning environment that is committed to supporting their educational development and genuine participation no matter where they are on the learning continuum. This inclusive model has the learning environment adapt to fit the needs of the learners, rather than the learners needing to adapt to fit the learning environment. In the next few Newsletters, I will provide some tools and adjustments that you can use to support the learning and lives of not only neurodiverse students but all students.

Topic One: Working Memory

Psychologists use the term 'working memory' to describe the ability we have to hold in and mentally manipulate information over short periods of time. Working memory is often thought of as a mental workspace that we can use to store important information.

We use our Working Memory:

- Remembering a new telephone number, a PIN number, or a vehicle registration number.
- Following spoken directions such as 'Go straight over at the roundabout, take the second.
- Remembering the unfamiliar name of a person who has just been introduced to you.

However, distractions, holding too much information and engaging in demanding tasks often lead to the loss of information from working memory.

Why is working memory important in classroom learning?

Many of the learning activities that children undertake in the classroom, whether related to reading, mathematics or science, can impose quite considerable burdens on working memory. Activities often require the child to hold in mind some information (for example, a sentence to be written down) while doing something that, for them, is mentally challenging (such as spelling the individual words in the sentence). Children with poor working memory also have problems following lengthy instructions to do one thing after another, as they can forget the instruction before the whole sequence of actions has been completed. As a result, the child will often not engage properly with ongoing classroom activities. Often it appears that the child has not paid attention, when in fact they have simply forgotten what it is that they have to do. Working memory is also needed to help us remember where we have got to in a complicated task such as attempting to write down a sentence the teacher has just spoken. The child needs to hold the sentence in working memory long enough to write the individual words down.

Typically, children with poor working memory:

- Behave as though they have not paid attention, for example forgetting part or all of instructions or messages, or not seeing tasks through to completion.
- Frequently lose their place in complicated tasks that they may eventually abandon.
- Forget the content of messages and instructions.

- Make poor academic progress during the school years, particularly in the areas of reading and mathematics.
- Are considered by their teachers to have short attention spans and also to be easily distracted.

How you can support Working Memory in your child:

- Look for warning signs of memory overload.
- Repeat information often and check for memory.
- Break down tasks and instructions into smaller components to minimise memory load.
- Reduce the overall amount of material to be stored (shortening sentences to be written or number of items to be remembered) increase the meaningfulness and degree of familiarity of the material to be remembered.
- Re-structure multi-step tasks into separate independent steps.

Respectful Relationships Update

At Boronia K-12 College we believe everyone in our community deserves to be respected, valued and treated equally. We know that changes in attitudes and behaviours can be achieved when positive attitudes, behaviours and equality are embedded in our education settings. Respectful Relationships aims to prevent gender-based and family violence in future generations by helping students develop positive relationships, resist harmful social pressures, resolve interpersonal conflict and seek and provide help when needed. This is done by promoting equity and respect through direct instruction but also through the systems and practices across the school and home.

As the new curriculum for Respectful Relationship is about to be released this term it is important to acknowledge that it will be more broadly and explicitly taught across the whole College in 2025. However, families can support students' social and emotional learning by developing their children's personal and social skills, attitudes and behaviours in different ways:

- Conversations with children: Talk to children about how they are feeling and helping them to reflect on their emotions.
- Role modelling: Children develop their social skills and attitudes by watching and experiencing how other people manage their emotions and relationships.
- Positive reinforcement: Recognise when a child demonstrates positive social, emotional and relationship skills will help instil good habits and behaviours.
- Providing a loving and calm environment: Establish rules and routines to provide structure and predictability.



OUR TIME 1: Social and emotional learning activities and conversation starters for kids and their families

Beyond the delivery of curriculum, the Wellbeing team in collaboration with Student Voice Team will be providing opportunities for the students to engage in both cohort and whole school social and emotional learning activities. We will be acknowledging "Wear it Purple Day" and the "National Day of Action against bullying". Consent education is now mandated and so the Year 10-12 students will

be engaged in a Consent Education class this week.

Students also visited the Shrine of Remembrance and participated in an Indigenous Heritage tour at the Royal Botanic Gardens. We were so impressed with how students engaged in all activities across the course of the week and were glad to have some sunshine!





Positive Behaviour Expectations (PBE)

We have continued our Positive Behaviour Expectation lessons this term, continuing to foster a positive and safe learning environment for all students. Throughout Term 3, we have spent lesson time unpacking and emphasising the importance of the following:

- Reflecting on Progress from Term 2 Semester Reports
- Setting Challenging Goals for Our Learning
- Identifying and Regulating Emotions

Students have engaged in learning activities that have allowed them to reflect on themselves as both learners and individuals, considering how they feel emotions and strategies they can use to regulate these.

In Our Classrooms

Across Middle School, students have been fully engaged in learning throughout this term. In English, students have been strengthening their text analysis and creative writing skills through text and genre studies. It has been fantastic to see students pushing and stretching themselves to further their skills as they dive into different texts.

In Maths, students have been exploring the application of number skills to financial mathematics, considering how their knowledge of fractions, decimals and percentages in applicable in a real-world context.


MIDDLE SCHOOL EVENTS


moments in sports history. The experience sparked lively discussions and a newfound appreciation for Australia's sporting legacy.


